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<u>1.WSPプログラム概要</u>

ワシントンスプリングプログラム(WSP)は、2022年2月に新型コロナ ウイルス感染症の影響で中止していた留学再開のために立ち上げた 新たな留学プログラムであり、全学部全学科の1年生から3年生を参加 対象としている。

亜細亜大学アメリカプログラム(AUAP)の留学先であるワシントン州の協定大学に、本学の春季休暇期間(2月から3月)中に約7週間派遣し、 生きた英語の習得と異文化を学ぶ本学独自の短期留学プログラムで ある。

アメリカという多種多様な人々が共生する環境での経験を通じて、 将来多国籍企業等のダイバーシティの場で協働して価値を創出する ことのできる人材の育成を目指す。留学先で履修した科目は卒業要件 の単位として最大4単位が認定される。



<u>2.WSPの目的及び成果</u>

留学先大学での授業や現地学生との交流などを通じて、 ①参加者の語学力の向上、 ②日本以外の世界の文化を受容し国際社会で活躍すべく 異文化理解力・受容力の体得、 ③本学の建学精神である「自助協力」を具現化する学生の 主体的な取り組みによる自己の再発見・成長、を目的としている。 また、留学経験及び留学前後の本学ならびに留学先大学での 学習で醸成される理解力や応用力を総合的に持ち合わすことで、 参加学生がグローバル・ビジネスリテラシーを備えた人材に成長 することをプログラムの成果としている。

WSP CLASSES

Students have settled into their classes and are making great progress in building their English skills and improving their confidence!

 Career Skills: This week students got more chances to interact with WWU student volunteers by discussing topics related to jobs and careers. In one small group activity, students went through a list of different jobs with a WWU student. The purpose of the activity was to build vocabulary related to jobs and careers and also to get students to think about careers that they might be interested in pursuing. Students also learned the terms "skill set," "hard skills," and "people skills" from a PowerPoint presentation prepared by the WWU Career Services Center. They used these terms to discuss skills that they have and then to think about careers in which those skills might be useful. They also finished watching the interview with the executive assistant and listened to more speeches by WWU student volunteers about jobs they've had. In addition, they studied an actual resume made by a WWU employee. They also watched a video example of a good speech and of a bad speech; these speeches were used to review the elements of an effective speech and served to introduce some information about the class project that will include creating a resume, giving a speech, and conducting a mock job interview over Zoom.



English Communication Skills: During week 2, the students continued learning about body language and gestures that can help improve their communication skills in the United States. This is particularly helpful for making themselves understood with volunteers in class, and during small talk and interpersonal invitations with other Western students. They also practiced their ability to create and ask questions. They practiced asking point / yes no / either or / WH / open-ended and personalized questions and presented their questions and answers with partners in front of the class. This type of activity will be particularly useful when the students have conversations at their upcoming high school and Japanese language classroom exchanges. The students also learned about the English language concept of "onomatopoeia," and, in pairs, they completed wonderful colorful cartoons using some of the words. Finally, because it was Valentine's Day, the students played a Valentine's Day "bingo" game, watched a video, and discussed the differences between Valentine's Day in America and Japan.



Beautiful Bellingham: This week was the students' first full week of classes. The students reviewed the bus routes in and around the Bellingham area, utilizing both the Whatcom Transit Authority's website and real-time app. They were introduced to a geography website called Seterra, where they played games identifying countries around the world using English names. They examined local maps of Bellingham, Washington State, and other parts of North America. The students also watched videos on experiences and outdoor adventures in Bellingham, as well as the art and cultural events held throughout Whatcom County. Friday was our first field trip. We traveled close to campus to a shopping area and visited a store REI that sells local hiking maps, outdoor apparel, and camping equipment, for any adventures the students might like to enjoy on the weekends. We also visited a Dollar Store that sells very inexpensive school supplies, books and stickers in English, and other items that might be useful during their stay here in the United States.

• Experience Class: Students have been learning more about Western and how to get around the area on public transportation. • **Career Skills**: On Tuesday, we reviewed information about the class project. In this project, students will identify a job they are interested in, write a job posting, and create a resume. They will do a job interview with the teacher on Zoom. Finally, they will give a PowerPoint presentation in which they explain the job they are applying for and why they are a good person to fill that position. Also, students reviewed some information about American-style job interviews and discussed some typical questions that are asked in U.S. job interviews. We also prepared for Thursday's visit to a yoga studio by going over the studio's web site and writing questions to ask the owner.

English Communication Skills: This week the students worked on problem solving situations in English. The main lessons of the week focused on role-playing the scenario of "going to the doctor." The students created sentences using health and body vocabulary and with partners learned useful words and phrases for expressing health symptoms to a doctor. They wrote sample dialogues connecting those phrases to themselves, and finally practiced leaving pretend messages on the WWU Student Health Center answering machine describing their symptoms and asking for an appointment. Later in the week, in preparation for Friday's trip to Fairhaven, the students listened to a short PowerPoint presentation on the social and emotional learning concepts of "wellness and self-care." Each student was given a small journal and a mindful scavenger hunt to bring with them to Fairhaven. Their weekend homework was to complete a journal entry on the field trip expressing some of the Social Emotional Learning concepts they learned.







Beautiful Bellingham: Early in their third week, the students continued to work on maps of the local area and larger maps of North America. Most of the students were now able to identify many of the individual states on the map of the United States and learned many of the nicknames for the states. The students also enjoyed informational videos on the history of Bellingham, including the city's role in boat building throughout the 20th century. Bellingham's major industries of fishing, boat building, and forestry were discussed. Midway through the week, the students visited the Wade King Student Recreation Center and were given an introduction to the climbing wall and a bouldering demonstration. Several of the students were brave enough to try climbing the wall themselves. Our Friday field trip this week was to Fairhaven, and everyone walked along Bellingham's iconic Taylor Dock.

English Communication Skills: English Communication Skills classes continued into the fourth week and included brainstorming work in groups, learning about and practicing writing professional emails. The students also visited the Ershig Assistive Technology Center and were given a presentation on this technology library with its diverse assistive tools and adaptations available to the Bellingham community. Our guide discussed the concept of "universal design" which makes environments accessible to all individuals, with and without disability. The ESL students were familiar with some of the tools including closed captioning and language translation applications. Mid-week the students viewed films online from the current Seattle Asian American Film Festival. The film festival represents Asian American voices, perspectives, and histories elevating the diversity and richness of Asian Americans in and around the Pacific Northwest. The short films ranged from humorous to unique, experimental, and poignantly emotional. Finally, the WSP students continued their journal writing with a reflection on their time at Bellingham HS and with a writing essay homework entitled, "A Day in My Life."











Beautiful Bellingham: A spectacular highlight from the fourth week of classes was undoubtedly the Tuesday visit to Bellingham High School. WSP students joined two beginner Japanese classes at the high school for conversations almost entirely in English. The students prepared questions for the day and showed exceptional leadership initiating and conversing with these younger American students. Two fun activities that day were lunch with their American classmates in a typical high school cafeteria, and some of the new friends enjoyed a pick-up American football game outside after lunch. It was an exceptional and intensive day for the WSP students, speaking English non-stop for almost 4 hours. Friendships were made, emails and social media accounts were exchanged. The week ended with a Friday field trip on the bus to downtown Bellingham and visits to the Lightcatcher and Old City Hall Museums. The students viewed a Native American art installation at the Lightcatcher, and the natural history exhibits in old City Hall included a historic bird taxidermy collection designed in collaboration with the North Cascades Audubon Society.

They met with Mark Wright's Human Geography class, who were mostly freshmen, and then with his Japanese 3-4 students, who were older. Our students met in small groups with Mark's students and talked in English the whole time. Our students also ate lunch in the school cafeteria with the high school students. On Thursday, we went on a tour of the WWU Career Services Center and listened to a presentation by Carissa Bane, one of the career counselors. Carissa went over the different services that the center provides and highlighted different parts of an American-style job search. She also gave some information about the career fair with our students attended the following day. On Friday, our students attended an education career fair. There were representatives from many different schools and school districts. WWU students who want to work in schools were also there. talking to the representatives of schools they were interested in, and our students did the same.

English Communication Skills: Early and mid-week the lessons connected English Communication Skills and Beautiful Bellingham and focused on Public Art around the world, here in the United States, and locally on the WWU campus. The students viewed videos on the public art of Christo and Banksy, as well as discussing the topic of Graffiti - Is it Art or Vandalism? Several of our volunteers helped in both Thursday and Friday classes as the students practiced "impromptu speeches." We started on Thursday playing impromptu speech games, throwing a beach ball with guestions to answer, winding a string around your finger at the same telling your life story, and playing "Yes And" an improvisational acting exercise. The impromptu speaking continued Friday. Each student individually chose a topic and was given 5 minutes to prepare for a 1-3-minute speech on their topic. Each speech was required to contain an introduction, 2 major points, transition words, and a conclusion. Students were given points for organization, clear and loud speech, body language, looking up from their notes, and creativity. There were some fantastic impromptu speeches on a variety of interesting topics!













Beautiful Bellingham: Week 5 included another great visit to Bellingham High School on Tuesday. Later in the week, the students learned about the extensive art collections here at Western. There are over 30 public art installations on the 215 acres of Western's Bellingham campus. The students read about the art sculptures and then partnered in groups of 3 and 4 to go out on campus and locate the artwork. Each student in the small groups had a particular sculpture to find on campus, and then they answered several reflection questions about their sculpture. The answers to the reflection questions were videotaped by their partners alongside pictures of the art.

Career Skills: On Tuesday, half of the students went to the Bellingham Airport with Dean and the other half went to the Chrysalis Hotel and Spa with Tom. At both locations, students toured the facility and had an opportunity to ask questions of staff members. On Thursday, we reviewed the career fair experience and the trips to the airport and the hotel. We also reviewed vocabulary for the vocabulary test next week and did listening practice to prep for next week's listening test. The listening test will be based on an interview in which an executive assistant talks about her job; students will listen to the interview and answer questions about it. The vocabulary test has words that we have been working with throughout the course. At the end of class on Thursday, we reviewed the final PowerPoint presentation assignment and students had time to plan their slides. On Friday, students had class time to actually make their PowerPoint slides. The teacher and WWU student volunteers helped with

English Communication Skills: Our skills class this week focused on the topic of sport and exercise in English. The WSP students practiced the GO DO PLAY grammar rules of talking and writing about sports, completing several worksheets. After watching an iconic sport speech by Nelson Mandela and discussing the career of Lance Armstrong, we broke into groups and debated the pros and cons of sport and considered whether "sport can bring people together." Some of the ideas discussed were fair play, teamwork, mental health, doping, sexism, and racism in sport. The students also practice listening comprehension with two assignments, including a sport radio news report. On Friday, the students were given instructions and the grading rubric for their final oral presentation, "My International Study Abroad Experience at Western." They started writing outlines for their presentations and speeches. Each presentation will be 4-6 minutes in length and include a 6-8 slide PowerPoint.



Beautiful Bellingham: Our week 6 field trip on Wednesday was a visit to Sparks Science Museum in downtown Bellingham. It was an electrifying trip full of explosions, flashes, and lightning blasts. Several of the students were brave enough to get into the Mega Zapper cage! The museum is described as "Ben Franklin meets Frankenstein, where science meets fun." The students also had lunch downtown and some walked to see the new waterfront bike and skateboard parks. The students wrote in their journals about the day to reflect on and capture some of the memories. Thursday, we visited the engineering department's Makerspace with our volunteer Jiana, an engineering major. The space is open to all Western students as a place to manufacture innovative items using multiple technologies and tools like 3-D printers, soldering irons, and a variety of textiles.

Final Week: Seven weeks has come and gone so quickly and the WSP students will be missed by roommates, suitemates, classroom volunteers, teachers, and WSP staff! We are so proud of the WSP students who filled their seven weeks with English study, travel, challenging themselves in many ways, as well as engaging with the WWU and the local community. Career Skills: This week was devoted to guizzes and presentations. During the program, students have listened to several interviews that the teacher did with various people about their jobs. For example, a physical therapist talked about being a physical therapist, and a high school teacher talked about being a high school teacher. For the listening quiz, they listened to an executive assistant talk about working with her boss (they listened to the same interview several weeks ago) and they answered three comprehension questions about what she said. Students also took a vocabulary guiz, which contained words that were introduced all through the course. Students also gave PowerPoint presentations about their "dream job." They explained the job duties and why they should be hired. For example, one student said, "This job is the best job for me, and I am the best person for this job." This assignment incorporated several assignments that students had worked on during the course, including one assignment to write a job posting for their dream job and another assignment to create an American-style resume. Many students did a good job of using vocabulary that was covered during the course, and as a whole the presentations were fun to listen to. A wide range of careers was represented, including lawyer, stockbroker, flight attendant, comedian manager, and police officer. Students received video feedback on Canvas

from their teacher.

English Communication Skills: Our last week of classes was devoted to individual student PowerPoint presentations. We reviewed notes from their previous impromptu speeches and looked again at the grading rubric. Students were reminded to speak loudly and clearly, look up from their notes, use gestures and body language, and practice their speeches as they created well-organized, colorful slide presentations called "My International Study Abroad Experience at Western." The students presented on both Tuesday and Wednesday of the final week. Each presentation was at least 4 minutes in length and included 6 to 8 PowerPoint slides. There was a fantastic variety of favorite experiences, as well as some lovely, poignant reflections on their time in America. So many students spoke about the great friendships they have made, and the beautiful time spent in nature while they have been at Western. It was a wonderful two days of speeches. We were also delighted to receive the students' phenomenal post-program TOIEC scores in the last week.











Beautiful Bellingham: It is hard to believe the Spring 2024 WSP program is almost over. We were incredibly lucky to have beautiful weather for the final weekend and week in Bellingham. We had no field trips this week; the students focused on their final presentations. The Beautiful Bellingham final consisted of question-and-answer discussions about their PowerPoint presentations.
