

• Career Skills: This week, we reviewed information about the class project. In this project, students will identify a job they are interested in, write a job posting, and create a resume. They will do a job interview with the teacher on Zoom. Finally, they will give a PowerPoint presentation in which they explain the job they are applying for and why they are a good person to fill that position. Also, students reviewed some information about American-style job interviews and discussed some typical questions that are asked in U.S. job interviews. On Thursday, a speech language pathologist came in. We practiced asking questions. First, students wrote some getting-to-know-you questions because they had never met the guest speaker before. Then they watched a short video about the career of speech pathologist. We reviewed some of the vocabulary in the video, and then they wrote questions to ask the guest speaker. They took notes on what she said, and then used their notes to write complete sentences.

English Communication Skills: During week 3, the students continued using their Mood Meters to improve vocabulary and learned more about body language and gestures to help improve their communication skills in the United States. This is particularly helpful for making themselves better understood with volunteers in class, during small talk and interpersonal social events with other Western students. We are looking forward to two class exchanges next week where they will put their new skills to work. Students also practiced creative writing and speaking skills with their "Partner Role Play" presentations. Groups of three were given amusing speaking scenarios and together with the help of the teacher and volunteers created short One-Act plays together. Some scenarios were "visiting a haunted house" and "bad food at a restaurant." The groups acted out their plays in front of the class to rounds of applause. The plays focused on using some dramatic verbal and non-verbal language and gestures. Friday's class included pronunciation feedback and work on pronunciation with practice using "minimal pairs." We welcomed two new volunteers and enjoyed a wonderful week of classes.
